(More Than) A Few Words **From the Other PA**

Hey Shiga,

I will admit that I'm at a loss as to how to begin this... It seems like only yesterday I was riding the shinkansen from Tokyo, struggling to stay awake after my first all-nighter and wondering if I'd get to see Mt. Fuji for the first time. I'm sure all of you remember your ride from Tokyo to Shiga. For me, some standouts were talking with Az, who I had only met an hour or so earlier, and meeting Paku, who I will never forgive for snagging one of my sushi rolls. As the train entered Shizuoka, Bob turned around and announced we might be able to see Mt. Fuji soon. I felt an anxiety that has only resurfaced in these final months of my ALT life.

I was worried that the shinkansen might be the only time I would see Mt. Fuji before I finished my JET tenure. At the time, I had no idea how long I would stay in Japan. I had been thinking that one or two years would be enough. My calculations were severely off, but I am glad that they were. The limited timeline gave me the impetus to attack my life in Japan with a selfish desire to pursue only what I truly wanted to do, and not waste it on other things.

Thus, within two weeks of arriving, I found myself playing slap the bag with some Nagahama crazies and any willing Japanese partiers at a techno festival in Niigata. The following morning I was awoken at 6 am, after an arduous odyssey back to my tent just two hours earlier, to go climb Mt. Naeba, a 2,145-meter behemoth-and an excellent hangover cure. This experience taught me two things:

1.) 山 is life

2.) <u>Say "yes"</u> to opportunities

These have guided me well in Japan. I've made some of the closest friends I've ever had and experienced the best of Japan thanks to climbing. I've gained valuable life and work experience as a block leader, AJET leader, National AJET Director, and as your PA, all because I saw an opportunity and said, "yes." In fact, the only time I said "no", almost cost me the love of my life when I didn't accept an invitation to an onsen after my first welcome BBQ (buy me a drink and you might hear the story).

Approaching life as a series of opportunities (as opposed to obligations) has been a great boon to my mental health in this country. Instead of despairing about SDC presentations, I saw them as opportunities for personal growth in public speaking, as well as a good impetus to learn more about my given topic. Instead of accepting my role as a tape recorder in class, I took the opportunity to get creative and initiate English journaling and international penpal projects at my schools. And as my programs caught on, my JTEs began to realize they could rely on me in class for more than just my angelic voice! I know that ESID, so I won't preach to do as I did, but I have found that seizing opportunities-no matter how small-will help bring a sense of accomplishment and satisfaction that many people lack in their work-life.

I didn't "find myself" or "discover who I am" because of the JET program. But something I did come to realize is that we are nothing more than a wet canvas. While there is always a discernable image of who we are that has been painted since childhood, it has never dried; it is constantly in flux with every new stroke of the brush or color of paint that is added throughout our life. As long as it is wet, we can never simply cover our previous painting. I may seem to be nothing like who I was in university (a quick look at any pictures from my first year here will tell you that), but the tertiary colors of my life have only been created from the blending of primary and secondary colors of my past. Our paint never dries.

The anxiety I felt on the shinkansen 5 years ago has resurfaced as I approach the end of JET. It seems that everything has happened in a fleeting moment and I am fearful of missing a final opportunity. But this time I am reassured, knowing that my canvas is infinitely brighter than before, and it will continue to shine through whatever paints may be thrown on it-we do not simply move on and leave the past to passive memory.

So my message to anyone that has made it this far is to never settle into a fixed idea of who you are or of what defines you. Attack every obstacle, fear, and challenge as an opportunity to add a dash of color to your canvas. If you do, I think you will find your time on JET (no matter how long it may be) has not been wasted.
