

#### 2-Plankers and Tray Sliders If slip-sliding down the slopes is your thing, then Shiga is a great place to be. Home to

more than a handful of quality mountain slides, Shiga can keep ya content and happy throughout the season. Oku-Ibuki is the biggest resort with Hakodate and Biwako Valley on the north-west side coming in close second. While none of these offer the gnar pow that <u>Susano-o shredded</u> in Japanese lore, they have great atmospheres and public transport access. If it's your first winter in Shiga, ask your sempai JETs for the low down on your closest hills. If you are looking to powwow with the pow-pow, grab your snorkeling mask and head north! Nozawa Onsen, Hakuba Cortina, and Myoko Kogen are all doable in a weekend—albeit with almost no proper sleep. Most major resorts in the Japanese Alps have night buses that run from Kyoto and Osaka station with options to include lift tickets at a discounted price (look for discounts and included lift tickets when booking hotels too!). Check their websites to find links to bus services (in the アク セス page). If you need help finding the right mountain and transport, send a message to Nick and he'll sort ya out.

Don't hesitate to just wear your winter coat inside when you come in. That might not be possible at school, so have jumpers, sweaters, scarves, blankets, capes, shawls or whatever else you can to keep yourself warm. They say you lose heat from your <u>head</u>, so keep your neck and head <u>covered</u>. Cold feet are often a problem and there's

only so much you can do to keep them warm. Get slippers and kairo inlays for your shoes, carry a change of warm socks or "room socks", keep a foot-heating pad under your desk. Work on improving your circulation by moving and doing sports. On kairo, you can get them for cheap and keep them around for hours of warmth. In addition

to the inlays, they come in adhesive and non-adhesive forms. Just don't stick them directly to your skin or use them around heat sources. If you're cold in the morning and don't want to get out of your futon to change, you might

consider sleeping with your clothes and changing

under your blanket.

#### heater. They come in a variety of shapes and sizes, but your main ones are

electric and gas. The former is more expensive, but may seem safer; the latter is cheaper, but comes with a distinct smell and ventilation requirements, lest you get a headache. Tip: refill it outside. When using your AC/heater unit, make sure you turn it off when you leave. If you want to save money, you can turn it off while you sleep and use the timer setting to turn it back on about an hour before you wake up (you can also set it to start before you get home after work). Finally, let's not forget the kotatsu, king of winter furnishings, great with some mandarins! Enter at your own risk; you will never want to leave...

And don't sleep underneath it for too long (seriously, this time)! When using any type of heating, remember to moisturize and keep hydrated.

This Little Piggy Stayed in Its Futon

#### A guide for the forgetful and those who have never known the cold You may have noticed that winter is upon us and that, despite its palm trees,

Shiga is cold (and humid!). How do I deal with this <u>misery</u>? you may ask. <u>Just</u> ask a Canadian! (Canadians' Japanese winter preparedness not guaranteed. Results may vary.)

#### You will probably end up only using a few of your rooms to save on energy. Compartmentalizing is an important part of surviving winter, even if some parts of your house turn into a winter wonderland

Sleeping, Bathing, Eating and Other Needs

Much like the kotatsu, electric blankets and carpets are your friends. They can keep you warm if you don't want to have your heater on all night (and are not as drying). You can also keep a hot-water bottle under your covers, or at your feet if you sit down a lot.

You can also find heated cushions. Tatami rooms tend to be a tad warmer and are great for sleeping, but you can't really cook or bathe there. Take a portable heater with you in the kitchen or when coming out of the shower (please not in the shower!). On that note, try drying yourself and putting on clothes ASAP after <u>ablutions</u> to retain most of the heat. If <u>your bathroom is too cold for you</u>, you can visit the nearest onsen or <u>public</u>

If your floor is cold, you can install rugs in spot where you know you'll be standing, even if you already have slippers. To warm yourself up, keep tea, coffee and soup around and learn how to make comfort food like curry rice. Have friends over for nabe and leach off their body warmth. Get Hot Yuzu or other, inferior, drinks from the combini. Many of these can be reheated later, after transferring them to a microwaveable cup.

If you aren't lucky enough to have a heated toilet seat, you can get a cover or buy removable stickers with different designs at 100-yen stores.

### Now that your room is warm, how do you

make sure that sweet heat doesn't escape? It's never too late to install <u>plastic</u> or <u>bubble wrap</u> over your windows. You can also get strips at 100-yen shops to fill in cracks and to collect condensation. Use thick curtains on outside windows (hopefully your only windows?) to keep the cold out, and <u>noren</u> on your inside **Enjoying yourself** 

There is a variety of winter activities, including the AJET ski/snowboard trip, that allow you to stay active. Exercise will help keep you fit, warm, and happy. If that's not your jam, but you don't want to go home to a frigid apartment after being at school all day, you can just spend time at <u>malls</u>, theatres, karaoke places and other venues where you can warm up. You can take a train ride and sit on heated seats. Or of course, hang out with friends!

#### **Driving** If this is your first time driving in snow,

read up about things to do and drive carefully. You will want to get a shovel for your parking, but also one to carry in a pinch. If you drive a kei car, you may want to add extra weight to it in case you end up driving in strong winds. To defog your windows, warm them up; however, don't do it too fast or you may get condensation Additional things you'll want to carry



**Continued Concerns for Fukushima** 

Nuclear Power Plant made headlines across the globe, calling into question the health and safety risks of nuclear energy in the modern age. For many, the thought of nuclear power and radioactivity stir up images and memories of bombs, catastrophic meltdowns, grotesque deformations, horribly named hot sauce, and death. Though there are constant efforts to clean and restore the area, Fukushima remains a radioactive place, and citizens throughout the country worry about the safety of the meats, produce, and water coming from Japan. In response to these concerns, the Consumer Affairs Agency of Japan has put out a brochure to help dispel overreactions and better educate the public about the dangers of radioactivity and the procedures in place to inspect and guarantee quality and safety of products in Japan.
